DNA Discovery Support Group (Virtual) Tuesday, May 2, 8:00-10:00 PM ET

If you have either found family using commercial DNA testing or been found by family who used commercial DNA testing (examples of commercial DNA testing are Ancestry.com, Family Tree DNA, 23&Me, My Heritage, etc.) then this is the group for you. You do not need to have a formal adoption connection to be in this group, but you do need to have a DNA discovery for this group to be relevant to you. Finding family, or being found whether you are looking or not - is a major life event. It can upend long-held beliefs about ourselves and challenge the very things that make us feel like, well..., ourselves. This group will focus on supporting each other during and after such DNA discoveries. These are not one time events; they are lifelong journeys. This peer support group is not meant to delve into the technical aspects of understanding your DNA results. but rather serve as additional support on your personal journey to integrate your DNA findings into your life. Facing Shame: How I was forced out of hiding and into a spotlight where I found the freedom of truth and acceptance.

Monday, May 8, 8:00-9:00 PM ET presented by Cathryn Vogeley

Whether you are a first mother or an adoptee, you probably know shame. Cathryn Vogeley never intended to write the story, I Need To Tell You, of her pregnancy as an unwed mother. But during her first writing course taught by Blackbird author Jennifer Lauck, Cathryn reacted to Lauck's tale of being 'ripped from her mother's arms'. Through her tears, Cathryn disclosed (in private) to Lauck that she relinquished her baby in 1969. Jennifer insisted that Cathryn write her story because this is where her pain lived. Three years later, Cathryn had a finished manuscript using Susan Siskin as a pseudonym because using her own name was unimaginable. But when she learned a credible memoir must include the author's true name. Cathryn discovered her self-image was still shrouded in incapacitating shame. Cathryn talks about her process of overcoming this barrier and finding freedom from that heavy mantle she wore for decades.

There Will Be Drama: Staging Our Adoption Stories

"My birth was a covert operation; my adoption, a comedy of errors... and it's pretty much been a Lifetime movie tearjerker ever since," writes journalist/theatremaker Julie Coppens. Julie first conceived *THE STORK FILES: TRUE STORIES OF ADOPTION, ABORTION, AND HAVING NO CHOICE* as a magazine article, examining the dramatic power of adoption stories through time; now, seven years and a few Supreme Court decisions later, she's developing it as a stage work, set to premiere in June at the 2023 Cincinnati Fringe Festival.

Julie hopes to inspire the kind of personal truth-telling that cuts through political rhetoric, deepening our understanding of these complex social phenomena that have such profound impacts on our lives and communities." Risks and Implications of Unlicensed Adoption Brokers in Private Adoption Monday, May 22, 8:00-9:00 PM ET presented by Kelsey Vander Vliet Ranyard

The landscape of private adoption has changed dramatically with the rise of the Internet. With fifty different sets of state statutes governing private adoption across the country, and approximately half of all adoptions now being interstate, there is cause for confusion. Not only does the digital world complicate adoption, but the rising presence of unlicensed adoption entities in this field throws an additional wrench in the process.

When unregulated, unqualified, and unlicensed adoption entities broker the placements of children with no structure of oversight or discipline, our children, birth families, and adoptive families have already been failed. In this session, Kelsey speaks to the legal research that Ethical Family Building has been doing for several years and the movement they are now building to prohibit unlicensed adoption brokers from operating and advertising. Additionally, Kelsey talks about the risks posed to all parties when working with an adoption broker, and how to protect yourself and others
